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Not Wanted: Biofuels

Manchester activists played a major role in a nonviolent blockade of Vopak's Agrofuels depot in Thurrock, Essex on Wednesday August 9.

Seven people blockaded the site's access road, locked together with arm tube device's while a further 4 unfurled a 35 foot banner from the top of an oil silo and then locked themselves to the stairwell. Essex Police then forcibly removed protesters blockading the road. Several protesters sustained significant cuts and bruises as a result

One activist, Dean Rivers said (while chained to a stairwell): "Companies like Greenergy and Tesco who use Thurrock are profiteering out of the rush to biofuels. This is causing food price rises, hunger for millions, ecosystem destruction and accelerated climate change. These are crimes against humanity and the earth from CARBON OFF SETS which we may never recover."

Wanted: A Carbon Guru

The hunt is on for a 'Green Guru' to guide the city of Manchester through the challenges of climate change. The position -Senior/Research Fellow- is being offered by the University of Manchester's Architecture Research Centre in a bid to improve the understanding of urban responses to climate change in Manchester and also build networks between cities and organisations to knowledge share. The Fellow must identify new 'technically plausible and socially viable options' for urban environments in their response to climate change.

Bruntwood Initiative for Sustainable Cities and Oglesby Charitable Trust have fronted some dosh for the project, which aims to produce a 'blueprint for an integrated climate change adaptation strategy' for Manchester by the end of 2010. It's a 3 year

August 5 Business in the Community, (www.bitc.org.uk) has appointed Gudrun Cartwright as north west officer to help companies address their environmental concerns. She will coordinate a 2 year North West Regional Development Agency project to help business address climate change.

August 7 Leisure group Next Generation, which

includes David Lloyd Leisure, has sealed a major green energy deal with Salford-based power specialist Ener-g that will save the group £900,000 and cut carbon emissions by 16,060 tonnes annually. August 7 A gas-fired power station that will supply electricity for 500,000 homes will be built at Carrington, near Sale, and operational by 2012. August 8 British Airways, Alpha Airports Group, SSP UK Air and VLM Airlines, along with the publicly-owned Manchester Airport, have all joined the pro-Transport Innovation Fund bid United City group, now at 107 members.

August 11 Crain's Manchester Business reports that Coronation Power, whose previous application to build a wind farm near Todmorden was rejected, has resubmitted a modified application to Rochdale and Calderdale Councils.

August 13 Meeting took place to plan contents and distribution of "Only Planet", a book of articles about Manchester and Climate Change. www.onlyplanet.info

August 4 The UK's biggest food distributor, Brakes Brothers, begins charging a 98p fuel levy on every delivery it makes. Retailers not best pleased. August 4 An Environmental Audit Commitee report says that although the government's plan to increase car tax for "gas-guzzlers" is a step in the right direction, the environmental benefit would be limited, and more ambitious changes were needed

August 4 Autotrader reports that only 45% of the people it polled regard a vehicle's carbon dioxide emissions as an important aspect of their purchasing decision.

August 8 Malcolm Wicks, UK energy minister, tells the Guardian that "all is lost on global warming" unless the world finds a new clean coal technology very soon.

August 3-10 Climate Camp- www.climatecamp.org.uk **August 11** Four protestors unfurl a banner advocating veganism as a way to reduce carbon (and methane!) emissions above Smithfield Meat Market in London.
